The deciding factor was Jack Roche's home run into the left field bleachers. This blast carried a laugh with it, for Poles, the fleet left fielder, chased back of the screen, retrieved the ball in time to make a play on Roche, but forgot the wire neiting separating himself from

the home plate, chucked the ball into the netting and almost was wounded when it bounced back to him.

Gardner pitched well for the Giants after a shaky first frame. Timely raps by the San Diego swatters accounted for three runs in this period.

The fielding and hitting of Downs, the Lincoln shortstop, was the feature of the game, aside from the pitching of Meadows. Downs made plays yesterday which convinced the fans that the Giant management is not boasting when they claim Downs the best colored infielder in baseball.
