Only seven innings were played because the Atlantic City team desired to catch a train to New York, they being billed to play a double header there on Sunday.

Frequent downpours which came after dinner dampened the playing field badly and a gang of workmen found it a difficult task to get the field back into real good condition. However, the game was played and was witnessed by a crowd that filled the two stands.

Spectacular fielding by both teams kept the crowd interested. Hutchinnon grabbed everything that was hit! in his direction with discouraging ease. In the fourth Peploski slammed a terrific drive at him. He got it with his bare hand. At that "Hutch" didn't have anything on our own third sacker. In the third Helfrich enacted the feature play of the performance when he stabbed Lloyd's scorching liner with his gloved hand and pegged to Yost for a pretty double.
