Failure of several of the holdover outfielders to arrive this morning caused the Portland manager to call on some his recruits for the appening game. Even should the holdover players arrive early tomorrow they will not be in uniform, for McCredie does not care to take chances on injuries. Following is to be the batting order:

St. Mary's batting order has not been announced.

Murphy and Stumpf have been in camp only two days, but are near enough to condition to work. Had the regular outfielder arrived, McCredie would have worked three of his new pitchers.

McCredie in Uniform.

For the first time since the training season opened McCredie was out in suniform this morning. Pitchers had their first real workout and regulars and recruits all cut loose a few fast ones.

Scientific work with the stick was resorted to, every man being ordered to place his hits. About half of the practice was given over to bunting. Coltrin shows up well at this work, as he laid down several perfect ones. Murphy and Stump! both seem to be

hitting the ball with regularity.

Bishop, pitcher, arrived from his home in Oakland and was out in uniform. Bishop is a football star of the Kansas University and played the bench with the Cleveland Americans last year. Last year was his first in baseball and Cleveland sent him to California for seasoning.

Captaincy to Be Offered Speas.

On the arrival here of Bill Speas the field captaincy of the club will be offered to him, according to McCredie. Speas may not accept, as he has responsibility enough in playing his post-tion.
