It is only fitting that he should play a big part in the sport event of the big celebration. Other old players will be included in his club, including Slats Peterson and Mike O'Neill.

Stars Here Two Days

The Lincoln Stars, who play here on Wednesday and Thursday are a wonderful collection who have won 117 out of 130 games played this season. They have defeated the Long Branch Cubans, who in turn have defeated many of the major league clubs, and most of the International League clubs in Sunday games at Long Branch, N. J., With the stars is Bill Poles, a former Harrisburg Giant player, who covers center field and is known as the colored Ty Cobb.

The old time Cuban Giants were always great favorites here and fans still talk of Foster, the big pitcher; Johnson, the crack shortstop; Mon-roe, the clown third baseman and Buckner, the big pitcher and outfielder who knocked the longest hit that has ever been made on the island grounds.
