THE CUBAN STARS WIN THREE STRAIGHTS FROM THE AMERICAN GIANTS.

Wickware, Foster and Witworth Unable to Stop the Islanders—Chacon Exhibits Great Work at Short—Many of Chicago's Leading Business Men and Women Witness Game July 4 and 5—10,000 People See Game on Independence Day—Same Teams to Play All the Week and Big Game for Next Sunday.

Chicago, Ill., July 7.—Never before in the history of this city were there as many colored people to see a game of baseball as there were on July 4 when the American Giants played their sec-

ond game in the series between the Giants and the Cuban Stars. Early in the day the clouds hovered the city of Chicago, but the weather man said fair but cool. But at the time the game was called not a cloud was in sight and the weather man predicted truthfully an ideal day. It was just cool enough to not draw a ripple of perspiration in the sun. Long before noon the fans began to arrive at the park. They came in taxi's, jitney buses, automobiles, carriages and street car and many walked, the number being 4,000, the largest ever to attend this park. The crowd stretched around by the score board. It was the Cuban's day. The score board was 4 to 1. It was their second victory, having won on Sunday, July 5. It was an airtight game throughout. Mr. Foster was in the box. He pitched a splendid game but it was a few costly errors that cost him the game. He not only pitched a great game but was the only man to score on his side. In balls, he stole to second. Jimmy passed the sixth inning he got to first. After the ball, Rube went to third. He stumbled and Rube went galloping home. In the fourth inning the Cubans scored on errors of "Peggy", Barber and Allison. It was in the eighth inning when the Cubans did their dirty work. Over in the grand stand a Cuban was there with his Cuban flag. He was cheering his boys to victory. "Rube" passed a man, then a hit batsman.

a man, then a hit batsman, the last one being a double by Foster that was misjudged by Jimenez, gave the Cubans three runs. The crowd there by the thousands and the noise and roared so loud that they were heard at the City Hall. "Killer" Foster struck out four men and Jimenez struck out four.
