For the first time in many years the Royal Giants, a team of colored champions, will make their appearance in this city, meeting the Perth Amboy Pacers of the Atlantic League at Amusement Park grounds at 3.30 this afternoon. This game against the Royal Giants will be the crucial test for the batters of the local club, as it will be the first time that the team will have faced first class pitching and the batting strength of the players who have been hitting the ball on the nose during the practice sessions will be given the acid test.

Included in the lineup of the Royal Giants are several well known characters who have been playing ball on the various colored teams which have been touring the country for the past half dozen years. The lead off men on the Royals' batting order include Webster, Bradley, Handy and Thomas, all of whom are batters of the type that knock the ball over the fence.

The Pacers will have their best lineup in the field in both the games today against the Royals and in the battle against Doc Scanlon and the Tottenville A. C. tomorrow. The regular team which is to represent Perth Amboy in the Atlantic League this season has been practically picked and it is only possible that one or two changes may occur in the lineup that will be presented today.

Clark, who is leading off for the Pacers, is the young player who was turned over to the Perth Amboy club by "Gene" McCann, manager of the New London club of the Eastern Association. Clark is a wonderful little player and with a fast man like Morgan playing alongside him at short, the batters will find it a dif

ficult task to hit balls between them. Clark and Morgan are the original "Speed Twins." Both are fast on their feet, especially Clark, who is an excellent base runner.

Ganley is batting second on the list. Bob is the right man in the right place. If the first batter gets on base, Ganley can always be depended upon to advance him along. Next comes the heavy artillery in the batting order with Sharkey, Meara, Kingston and Mulcay following in the order named. Morgan is hitting eighth, followed by the catcher and the pitcher.

The feast of baseball that is planned for tomorrow is perhaps the biggest offering made in this city in many a year. In the first game the Franklins and St. Anthonys will play the first of a five game series for a silver trophy offered by William Hechheimer, and for the \$150 cash prize offered by the Perth Amboy baseball club. There should be blood and thunder in this game, as the Franklins have secured the services of Applegate, their former hurler,

who is now a member of the regular hurling corps of the league club to twirl for them against the St. Anthony club. On the other hand the St. Anthonys will not be shy on pitching talent, as they will have Neider, their regular pitcher on the mound.

In the second game tomorrow there will be a hard battle. The Tottenville A. C. has been strengthened by the addition of "Doc" Scanlon, pitching; Froelich catching and Romer on first base. The remainder of the Tottenville team is composed of first class semi-pro players and they should give a good fight to the professional players.

Scanlon's appearance against the Pacers tomorrow will be his debut in the city of Perth Amboy. The fans of this city well remember Scanlon's work at New Brunswick last

season, when he shut the Franklins out without a hit or a run. This game was the second of a three-game series, the New Brunswick club having previously been defeated by the Franklins. Scanlon's victory tied the series.

Tottenville will send a large delegation of fans over to see the game tomorrow, as they are intent on defeating the Pacers. However, Bob Ganley insists that the Tottenville team will have to score some runs off the Perth Amboy pitchers to win. Ganley is saving his best mounsmen for the game against Tottenville, and he feels certain that the hits for Tottenville will be less than those secured by the Pacers off Scanlon.
