

BROOKLYN GIANTS HERE WEDNESDAY

Globe Tire Will Clash With
Famous Colored Nine—5
O'Clock Game Time

The original Brooklyn Royal Giants, said to be the strongest colored team ever organized, will be the attraction at the Globe Tire Athletic Field next Wednesday afternoon. Nat C. Strong, manager of the Giants, consented to bring this aggregation of ball tossers here only after considerable dickering and a guarantee beyond the reach of past patronage.

To encourage sports and furnish baseball seen only in big league parks, the Globe management has spared no expense in putting on a team of local boys considered to be the stars of their respective positions hereabouts. Other clubs to be brought here are Chinese, Cuban Stars and several of the foremost big league clubs, including the New York Giants, Yankees, Dodgers and Phillies.

Harry Adams, who handled the indicator at the old Y. M. C. A. games, has been retained to umpire. His D. R. League work has been very satisfactory.

To make it possible for all Trenton fans to witness these stars in action, without any great inconvenience, loss of time or money, and to make it possible for potters and workers of the various building trades, clerks, office help, business men and women to enjoy the games, the management has decided to call the game at 5 o'clock instead of 4 o'clock, as has been the custom of the past.

The Brooklyn Royal Giants have promised a fast, snappy game, while the Globe Tire team has been schooled in taking and leaving the field on a trot. This also will give the Trenton fans an opportunity in comparing the local boys of today and those of the old Y. M. C. A. days, when independent ball was in its prime. With Lennie Frost, Jaynes, Red Justice, Billy Lloyd, Jimmie Travis, Andy Warner, Hillbourn, Warwick and McKee in its line up, the most promising local talent will oppose the colored team.
