

EDGAR'S TIMELY HIT WON FOR BENNINGTON

Home Run With Bases Full
Defeated Mohawk Giants

FINAL SCORE WAS 8 TO 6

Colored Players in the Lead When
Long Drive to Left Field
Changed Situation.

Bennington defeated the Mohawk Giants of Schenectady at Morgan park yesterday afternoon 8 to 6. The Huckleberry boys have now played four games with the fast colored team that has been representing Schenectady on the diamond during the present season and yesterday's contest was the first in which the Vermonters have come through on the big end of the score.

A remarkable home run hit by Edgar in the fifth inning really won the game for Bennington and gave the crowd an opportunity to witness

the performance of one of the most spectacular feats in baseball, a home run with the bases full. In order to have filled all of the requirements of a dramatic baseball performance the hit should have been made in the ninth inning with the score 3 to 0 in favor of the visiting team. There should have been three men on bases and two strikes on the batter. Edgar's hit did not complete this most nerve-racking of all imaginable climaxes in baseball combinations but it met most of the conditions. The Mohawk Giants were in the lead by a score of 3 to 2. There were three men on bases and there were two strikes on the batter. When the little center fielder hit the ball went out over left field into the before the ball was returned to the diamond.

Canfield of Hoosick Falls pitched for Bennington. He was batted rather freely and the hits by the dusky players were made in bunches, but there were not enough bunches to win the game. He pulled through the first three periods with but two hits and no runs scored. In the fourth the Mohawks "got to" him for a pair of doubles and a single and scored three runs. During the fifth, sixth and seventh he held the heavy hitting outfit to one single. In the eighth he was found for a double and three singles good for two runs and in the ninth three singles put another runner across the plate.

White, who pitched for the Mohawks, had difficulty in locating the plate. Prindle was passed three times and on two of the three free tickets he made the circuit of the bases. The third time he was sacrificed to second, stole third and was thrown out at the plate while attempting to score on an infield hit.

Bennington had the bases full and none out in the seventh but two batters went out on fly balls that were two short to permit the runner on third to reach the plate.

The Bennington team played without an error and only two mis cues were charged against the Mohawks.

Doyle, who started the season with Hoosick Falls and who was in the Rutland line-up for a time, took the place of Shortstop Conley who recently joined the Northampton club of the Twin State league. He made a good impression on the fans and secured one hit. The score:
