

HUDSON WINS DOUBLE HEADER

Game With Faribault Was Pretty
Exhibition and Went Ten
Innings for Decision.

Stillwater Had an Off Day All
Around, But Found Hoffman
In Seventh Inning.

The largest crowd for this season was at athletic park yesterday afternoon to witness the two baseball games, and they were well entertained. Collins' Giants of Hudson won both of the contests, the first one from the Flecks of Faribault by a score of three to two, and the second from Stillwater by a score of nine to six.

The Hudson-Faribault game was a fast and interesting one and it went ten innings. Hudson was braced up by some semi-professional players, including Pate, pitcher, and McDougal, both members of the colored Gophers. Faribault was shy a regular pitcher and put Lamb, the fast little short stop, on the mound. He did a remarkable stunt for a small fellow and one who is not a pitcher. Hudson got six hits off him while Faribault got seven off Pate, the fast colored man. Three of the hits off Lamb were made by Pate. Lamb showed up well in other features of the game, striking out ten, passing two and hitting one man, that being the same showing by Pate also.

Stillwater had an off day and Blanchard was not in good pitching form. Hudson started with three runs in the first inning on two singles, a double and three errors, one run in the third on a pass to first, a stolen base and a wild throw, and made it five runs in the seventh on four singles, two double-baggers and a couple of errors.

Stillwater kept piling up errors

until the seventh without being able to find Tony Hoffman, but in that inning made their six runs, three of them earned on three singles, two doubles, a man passed to first on balls and Crowley being hit by the pitcher. Scattering hits in other innings were of no avail. Frank E. Force of Minneapolis umpired both games. In the first game he called a ball a foul that struck outside the line, but rolled inside after his decis-

ion, but he did not change it. The decision helped both sides. He gave good satisfaction and caught Lamb cutting first base in the second game.

In the Hudson-Faribault game hits were six for Hudson, including a three-bagger, a double and a single by Pate, two singles by O. Solheim and a single by Altermarth and they made five errors, two each by McDougal at short and Williams at first with the other by Pate. Faribault made a total of seven hits of which Kehoe and Lamb made two; Bernstein, Malloy and Bowman one

each. Borrowman made three errors and Newgard one. Hudson had four left on bases and Faribault seven. Pate hit Newgard with a pitched ball and Lamb hit Griffin. The ten innings were played in an hour and 45 minutes.

For Hudson the battery was Pate and Hodgins; for Faribault, Lamb and Borrowman.
