

GREY SOX OPEN WITH NEW ORLEANS AND WIN

**Black Pelicans Trounced 6 to 3
Yesterday; Moss Hurlled Air-
tight Ball For Locals**

By hitting the old ball to all parts of the lot and playing safe on ball behind Moss, the Grey Sox broke their losing streak yesterday afternoon, and won the first game from New Orleans, 6 to 3. The honors of the day go to Red Cunningham, McCormick and Carpenter, whose heavy hitting was largely responsible for the locals' six scores.

New Orleans started the scoring of the game with two in the second and one more in the fourth but after this frame Moss tightened and held them scoreless for the remainder of the game.

The Grey Sox scored five runs in the

sixth inning when Carpenter slammed out a three bagger, with three men on bases and Red Cunningham hit for two bases with two men on. Another score was added in the seventh frame when Seales walked and scored on McCormick's three bagger.

In spite of the fact that the Grey Sox lost four straight games in the last series, they are still leading the league by a safe margin as the strong Knoxville team, which is second in the standing, was losing to Nashville while the Grey Sox were losing to the Black Crackers. Out of a four game series played with Nashville the strong Knoxville Giants were able to win only one game which gives the Grey Sox practically the same lead that they held before the series with Atlanta.

The Grey Sox showed up in old time form Monday afternoon and it looked as though they were trying to take out their Atlanta grudge on the New Orleans team. Every player in the team played a good game and did good work with the stick, and the team showed the old time pep and enthusiasm that was lacking in the Atlanta series.
