

Colored Players Vanquish Locals After Stiff Effort; Hubbard Tightens in Spots

It was a wicked contest at the stadium yesterday afternoon. The New York Lincoln Giants managed to get away with the long end of a 6 to 5 score after an arduous battle, thus making the series 50-50.

A well placed hit in a pinch in the ninth would have tied the score, but Gingiardi failed when put to the test and whiffed.

Jesse Hubbard, the black ace, was on the hill for the colored clan. He was slapped hard by the home hitters, but tightened in the pinches and was thankful for some grand fielding on the part of his infield helpers.

The Giants rambled off with a three-run lead in the first frame, reaching Elmer Hill with some opportune pokes which resulted in a

parade over the plate. Hits by Poles and Pettus did the principal damage. When the second chapter came around the first two dusksies swatted Hill safely, whereon Manager Downey derricked the heaver and gave "Stubby" Mach, a local boy, a chance to stop the rivals, which he did. Mach showed a lot of stuff and pitched fine ball. He was steady as a veteran and made a big hit with the fans.

LOCALS BREAK ICE

San Diego broke the ice in the second. Hubbard apparently had them well in hand when Miner, the home left fielder, soaked the ball over the left field wall with Compton on the paths, thus being responsible for the two home markers.

Safe swats were numerous during

the battle and each of the pitchers had to "bear down" hard to prevent scoring at various times. Sensational fielding on the part of Franz Hosp repelled a bevy of dark skinned base runners from trickling across in the fourth, for the bases were filled when the shortstop made a grand play on what looked to be a hit from the mace of the powerful Pettus. Hosp figured in three other fine fielding stunts before the afternoon was done, one a remarkable stop when Ginglardi tried for a double play at second base. Hosp made a one-hand stop and quick throw to Roche, which got the fleet Downs at that station.

The Giants had previously added another counter in the third, to which they produced one more during the fifth stanza. Their final digit, which eventually proved to be the deciding run, came in the eighth as a result of Mach's error, a sacrifice and Ginglardi's error.

GET TO HUBBARD

The home battlers found Hubbard

in the fifth long enough to collect a pair of runs for themselves. The final counter came in the seventh. Krug got on with a hit, Compton walked, Roche singled and Bassler walked, forcing in a run. With the bases filled two gone and two relief Giant-hurlers warming up in the bullpen. Ginzglardi struc kout.

The rally in the ninth which for a time threatened to drag the game from the fire, started when Krug singled sharply to center. Compton against drew free transportation. Miner fouled out, Roche walked, Ginzglardi again breezed at three
