Springman occupied the pitching mound for the Huntington representatives. He was well known to Huntington fans, having starred with the Marshites, several seasons ago. He gave six hits and one base on balls and fanned five of the Giants. Jones pitched six innings for the Giants, retiring in the seventh period in favor of Williams. Jones was touched for six hits and gave three bases on balls. He struck out five of his opponents. Williams gave two hits and fanned three of the Huntingtonians.

The Giants were blanked in the first inning, after which Kenny and Shultz tallied. In the second period the Giants took the lead, when Webster, Handy and Gatewood scored. In their half of the second the Huntington representatives tied the score when Kenny came home.

The Giants bagged three runs in the fourth inning, when Jones, Kennedy and Earle scored. In the sixth inning the Huntington team made a sprint for the lead when two more runs were scored, Coughlin and Kiley crossing the home plate. The Giants got their last two runs in the eighth inning, when Handy and Gatewood rounded the circuit.
