

# DICKINSON HOLDS DONALDSON DOWN

ELEVEN INNING GAME WITH-  
OUT SCORES. WORLD'S  
FASTEST C O L O R E D  
PITCHER COULD NOT  
PULL ALL NATIONS.

**Mandan Takes Game, 2 to 1. Dorfler  
Pitched Great Game. Dunn Cent-  
er Lost to Dickinson, While  
Beach Won 6 to 1.**

The best ball game ever witnessed on the Dickinson diamond was played Thursday afternoon between the locals and the All Nations. Eleven in-

nings were played without a score on either side and as per agreement the game ended. Gardner allowed but 3 hits and Donaldson, the colored pitcher, the same. Our side had 1 error and the visitors none.

After the 7th inning it was very evident that the All Nations were trying hard to hit but they were unable to connect. Both sides had men on bases and in the last of the 11th it looked for a few minutes as though Dickinson was going to score.

It is said that Donaldson is the best colored pitcher in the world. The speed with which he delivered balls is wonderful, and probably if it was not for his color he would be one of the highest salaried pitchers in the United States. He holds the world's record for playing 30 hitless innings, so it will be seen that Dickinson went up against the real thing Thursday.

Our people are loud in their praise for the fine work of Gardner and Wasem and for all the boys of the team for that matter. There was



good work on bases, in the field and all round.

This game was played to a \$300 crowd. Lewie Kostelecky umpired.

The Beach game was on for 4½ innings, the score standing 6 to 1 in favor of the visiting team. Otto Pippin pitched for Dickinson. It rained and the game was stopped in order to drag and prepare the ground for the large event.

The ball game with Mandan on the local diamond on Sunday was interesting, the score being 2 to 1 in favor of the visitors. Dorfler certainly did good work but it was not a "no hit" game as announced by Mandan.

Blanchard and Kostelecky umpired the game.

On Wednesday the Dickinson team took Dunn Center into camp to the tune of 12 to 2. It looked like a very close game for three or four innings. However, the swift twirler for the visitors seemed to have started in too fast as his playing later showed. The team work of the visitors was disappointing.

Armontraut pitched for Dickinson but otherwise the line-up was about the same as for the Mandan game.
