"Cyclone" Joe Williams was the whole show, twirling some of the best ball of the season. The white boys could not find him, and he struck out ten men in the first game. In the second game, which went eight rounds, he was touched up for seven raps, but he had such a lead that the white boys only made two runs, while the Giants made nine, and yet he did not extend himself. Williams and Pettus were stars with the willow. Williams got two ! doubles in the first, and many, many hits in the second. Winston came clean and got a twobagger in the first. Wright and Pettus made a double play in the second inning, and Wallace got a two-bagger in the same inning. Mike Moore made a splendid catch and a circus steal home.
